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Readings for Sunday 7th January 2024

Collect:

Creator of the heavens, who led the Magi by a star to worship the Christ-child: guide and sustain us, that we may find our journey's end in Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

First Reading: Isaiah 60.1-6

¹Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the LORD has risen upon you. ²For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the LORD will arise upon you,

and his glory will appear over you. ³Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.

⁴Lift up your eyes and look around; they all gather together, they come to you; your sons shall come from far away, and your daughters shall be carried on their nurses' arms. ⁵Then you shall see and be radiant; your heart shall thrill and rejoice, because the abundance of the sea shall be brought to you, the wealth of the nations shall come to you. ⁶A multitude of camels shall cover you, the young camels of Midian and Ephah; all those from Sheba shall come. They shall bring gold and frankincense, and shall proclaim the praise of the LORD.

Second Reading Ephesians 3. 1 - 12

¹I, Paul, am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles - ²for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given me for you, ³and how the mystery was made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, ⁴a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. ⁵In former generations this mystery was not made known to humankind, as it has now been revealed to his holy apostles and prophets by the Spirit: ⁶that is, the Gentiles have become fellow-heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel.

⁷Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. ⁸Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, ⁹and to make everyone see what is the plan

of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; ¹⁰so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. ¹¹This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, ¹²in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

Gospel: Matthew 2. 1 - 12

¹In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, ²'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' 3When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: ⁶"And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."' ⁷Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. 8Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.' 9When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. 10When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. 11On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. 12And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

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Introduction to the Season

In the Western churches, the Epiphany ('manifestation') became an occasion to celebrate one element in the story of Christ's birth, the visit of the far-travelled magi, understood as the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. Matthew's account speaks simply of 'wise men from the



east'; later tradition fixed their number at three, made them kings and recalled their resonant names – Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. In this perspective, Epiphanytide is an apt season to pray for the worldwide mission of the Church. The feast of the Conversion of St Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles, appropriately falls in the Epiphany



Manifest at Jordan's stream, Prophet, Priest, and King supreme; and at Cana wedding-guest in thy Godhead manifest. season, as does the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. In the Eastern churches, the Epiphany is, rather, the celebration of Christ's baptism at the hands of John, when the heavens were opened and a voice from heaven declared Jesus to be God's beloved Son. The miracle of Cana in Galilee, where Jesus 'first manifested his glory', follows immediately:

The arrangement of the Sundays of Epiphany in the Revised Common Lectionary deliberately draws out these aspects.

The season of joyful celebration that begins at Christmas now continues through the successive Sundays of Epiphany, and the festal cycle ends only with the Feast of the Presentation (Candlemas). The child who has been manifested to the magi at his birth is now recognized by Simeon and Anna, when he comes to be presented in the Temple according to the Law of Israel. He is both 'a light to lighten the Gentiles' and 'the glory of God's people Israel'. But the redemption he will bring must be won through suffering; the Incarnation is directed to the Passion; and Simeon's final words move our attention away from the celebration of Christmas and towards the mysteries of Easter.

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Background: The Epiphany Season from 6th January



The Epiphany [celebrated each year on the 6th January] has become an occasion to celebrate one moment in the story of Christ's birth, the visit of the far-travelled magi. The word "Epiphany" means manifestation or, more simply, "showing" hence its other title of "the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles." Ships today still carry a manifest showing everything that is aboard and political parties have manifestos showing everyone their plans for government.

St. Matthew's account speaks simply of 'wise men from the east'; later tradition fixed their

number at three [as there were three gifts], made them kings and gave them names – Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. Reading it again [Matthew 2. 1 – 12] you'll find no mention of camels or stables and the visit could have occurred at some time in the first two years of Jesus' earthly life.





In this perspective, Epiphanytide, therefore, is a suitable season to pray for the worldwide mission of the Church. The feast of the Conversion of St Paul, the Apostle to the Gentiles, appropriately falls in the Epiphany season, as does the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

In the Sundays immediately after, we focus on particular firsts in Jesus' life where his ministry is shown. The Sunday after Epiphany is a celebration of Christ's baptism by John, when the heavens were opened, a dove descended and a voice from heaven declared Jesus to be God's beloved Son [Matthew 3. 13 - 17].





The first miracle at Cana in Galilee changing water into wine, where Jesus 'first manifested his glory', follows immediately [John 2.1 - 11]. We often have the readings marking his first preaching in the temple [Luke 4.14 - 21] or calling the first disciples [Matthew 4.18 - 22].

The season of Epiphany ends as we move back to Jesus' infancy and the Feast of the Presentation (Candlemas) celebrated on 2nd February. The child who has been manifested to the magi at his birth is now recognized by Simeon and Anna, when he comes to be presented in the Temple according to the Law of Israel. He is both 'a light to lighten the Gentiles' and 'the glory of God's people Israel' [Luke 2.22 – 40]. But the redemption he will bring must be won through suffering and we move our attention away from celebrating the 40 days of Christmas and look ahead to the 40 days of Lent.



Epiphany letter from Bishop David

Dear sisters and brothers,



As we celebrate Epiphany, with its message that Jesus Christ is the Good News for the whole of God's creation, I want to begin by thanking each and every one of you for all that you have done to make this reality more widely known and lived throughout the Manchester Diocese over the last twelve months. Over these last few years, Covid notwithstanding, we have managed to put in place structures which I firmly believe better equip us for mission and ministry in our chaplaincies, schools, parishes and other mission contexts. We are also blessed with hugely talented and highly committed people, not least the record number of graduating stipendiary curates who will be moving into incumbency-level posts over the next few months, and the specialist staff arriving in our deaneries. Their focus is on enabling all of us to play our part in meeting our share of the national target to double the number of young people among our disciples.

The next twelve months will be a vital test bed for how we put our hopes and ambitions into practice. We are set up to achieve positive change, and now is the time to make it happen, so that the vision we have worked hard on, and with such widespread consultation and engagement, becomes the reality.

As our vision makes clear, all our efforts must be surrounded by prayer. The founding and growth of our Prayer Community has been a real joy. The commitment made by members is simple, but the effect of so much purposeful prayer is immeasurable. Over this next twelve months, I hope that many more individuals will feel able to commit to the simple rhythm it offers.

Most of us are only part of the church because somebody made the effort to talk to us about Jesus, or to invite us to a church event where we would hear the gospel set out. Whilst not every Christian is a gifted evangelist, we can all play our part, by being ready to share the difference our faith makes in our lives with those who ask or show interest. Beyond this, we need to identify, raise up and equip leaders who are gifted in evangelisation. My prayer is for everyone living or working in our diocese to be within reach of someone with whom they can identify, and who holds and can articulate our faith, in words and deeds.

Gifted Christian leaders do not simply grow on trees. They have to be found from among our church members, then nurtured and provided with opportunities for learning and development. We need to be diligent in identifying younger people and those from more diverse backgrounds, and making space for them to develop their gifts and skills. I am delighted that in 2024 so many curates will move on to positions of greater responsibility, however the work of finding the next generation of new leaders, lay as well as ordained, begins now.

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As I leave the Board of Governors of the Church Commissioners, I am aware of just how much we depend on money raised from national church endowments to support our mission and ministry. Not only do we receive over £2 million each year towards our poorer parishes, we have also had significant funds to establish fresh ventures such as Children Changing Places, Antioch, and our Resource Churches. It is right that we do receive such generous support; we are one of the dioceses with the least historic resources per capita in the country, and with a higher proportion of poorer parishes than any other. However, that does not remove the necessity to raise most of the funds that sustain our work locally. In 2024 we will need to redouble our efforts to develop a stronger culture of giving and generosity.

I look forward to sharing with you all, as we seek to build in 2024 from the sound base and healthy culture we now have. As we do so, it will be important that we look after ourselves and those around us. The yoke Christ lays upon us should not conflict with attention to our well-being. Indeed, the two go hand in hand. So, my hope and prayer is that 2024 will be a year that combines effort with excitement, where hope becomes reality, and that our labours will prove both fulfilling and fun.

May God bless you this Epiphanytide and throughout the year to come.

2023: Year in Review

2023 was a great year for the Diocese of Manchester. Here, we take a look back at some of the fantastic things that we achieved as a diocese.

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Organ Music - St Bartholomew's

Before the service, we'll have some pieces suitable for Epiphany including pieces based on the German Lutheran chorale "How brightly shines the morning star." The text was written in 1597 by Philipp Nicolai and first published in 1599 [it's number 100 in our hymn books if you want to read it] in a collection also containing the hymn "Sleepers wake, for night is flying" that we heard on Advent Sunday.

The tune has been claimed to be by Nicolai also but is at least 60 years older than the hymn. There have been many settings of it by composers of the era such as Bach, Buxtehude and Praetorius. In 1870 Peter Cornelius published his song "Three Kings from Persian Lands afar" which sets his tune above the chorale melody that acts as the accompaniment.

It's just a pity that the hymn has nothing to do with Epiphany and the reference to the star is not the one that led the Magi to the Holy Family. The hymn was written in 1597 in response to a plague and is based on Psalm 45, a mystical wedding song. Jesus is identified with the morning star, according to Revelation 22:16, and with the bridegroom of the psalm.

After the service, following on from the Advent / Christmas toccata season, we'll continue through the season on Epiphany in January starting with the "Carillon-Sortie" by **Henri Gabriel Mulet** (17 October 1878 – 20 September 1967).

His father Gabriel Léon Mulet was choirmaster of the Basilica of Sacré-Cœur, where his mother Blanche Victoire Augustine Gatin would also play the harmonium; as a boy he sometimes deputised for her. He studied at the Paris Conservatoire from 1890, where his teachers included Alexandre Guilmant and Charles-Marie Widor. He originally intended to be a cellist, but later served as an organist at several Parisian churches.





He wrote *Carillon-Sortie* during the time prior to 1917 when he was organ professor at the Ecole Niedermeyer and organist of the St Roch church in Paris [pictured]. It is a brilliant final voluntary in toccata style, imitative of a melodic set of bells, and dedicated to one of the leading virtuoso organists of the day, Joseph Bonnet, who played at the Paris church of St Eustache. It has been called "one of the great showpieces of French

Romantic organ music".

In 1922 Mulet published "Les tendances et antireligieuses néfastes de l'orgue moderne", an attack on modern schools of organ building; this was followed by similar essays. He deplored the trend to create organs which he felt were more appropriate for the cinema than for church: the organ was "a stained-glass window. Its tones of imposing and embracing calm flood the air of our cathedrals, in the same way that ...stained-glass windows bring down meditation upon the congregation."

In 1937, Mulet, following a financial crisis, destroyed his manuscripts and many of his possessions and left Paris for Draguignan (Var). There he continued as a church organist until 1958, often in poverty (his wife opened a toy-shop in the hope of increasing their income). Ill-health led Mulet and his wife, to retire to a convent in Draguignan, where he died in 1967

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2024


18th – 25th January 2024

Reflections on the story of the Good Samaritan have been prepared by an ecumenical team in Burkina Faso in Africa for use from 18 to 25 January.

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (WPCU) takes place each year from the 18 to 25 January. This special week provides an opportunity to focus our prayers on Christian unity, as well as speak about and experience Christian unity personally, in our village, town or county as well as engage with what happens at a national level.



This year the theme 'You shall love the Lord your God... and your neighbour as yourself' (Luke 10:27) has come from an ecumenical team from Burkina Faso, facilitated by the local Chemin Neuf Community (CCN).

They have reflected on the familiar story of the Good Samaritan, and all are encouraged to Go and do likewise. It is a story about crossing boundaries that calls our attention to the bonds that unite the whole human family.

Brothers and sisters from the Catholic Archdiocese of Ouagadougou, Protestant Churches, ecumenical bodies and the CCN in Burkina Faso collaborated generously in drafting the prayers and reflections.
