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Today's Readings:

The Collect:

Merciful God, your Son came to save us and bore our sins on the cross: may we trust in your mercy and know your love, rejoicing in the righteousness that is ours through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

First Reading: Isaiah 35.4 – 7a

4Say to those who are of a fearful heart,

'Be strong, do not fear!

Here is your God.

He will come with vengeance,

with terrible recompense.

He will come and save you.'

⁵Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; ⁶then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; ⁷the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water.

Second Reading: James 2. 1 - 10, 14 - 17 ¹My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favouritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? ²For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, 3 and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, 'Have a seat here, please,' while to the one who is poor you say, 'Stand there,' or, 'Sit at my feet,' 4have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? ⁵Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? 6But you have dishonoured the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? 7Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? 8You do well if you really fulfil the royal law according to the scripture, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.' 9But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. 10For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it.

¹⁴What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? ¹⁵If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, ¹⁶and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill,' and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? ¹⁷So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

Gospel Reading: Mark 7. 24 - end ²⁴Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, ²⁵but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. ²⁶Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. ²⁷He said to her, 'Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' ²⁸But she answered him, 'Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs.' 29Then he said to her, 'For saying that, you may go - the demon has left your daughter.' 30So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone. ³¹Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. 32They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. 33He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. 34Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' 35And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. ³⁶Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. 37They were astounded beyond measure, saying, 'He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak.'

Our Journey in Faith (Mk 7:24-37)

In today's world... when an ambulance driver gets a call, the job is to respond. They do not stop until they arrive at the location and tend the patient. Along the way they may pass any number of obstacles, but their mission is to answer the call. The same is true for fireman, policemen and soldiers. In fact, anyone with a job, or an impatient boss learns very quickly that if you are asked to do "something" then you do it and not go off and do "something else." Or there may be consequences.

The emergency services have a mission that is clear and precise. They have parameters: goals, objectives, and timelines.

In Jesus' world ...he is King of the Jews sent by God. His mission is clear,, his goals, objects and timelines are set by God, Jesus is the fulfilment of Gods promise to David.. '. I will appoint a single shepherd over them to tend them' He is the shepherd... He is the King... His mission is to the Lost Sheep of Israel and Gods kingdom,

Reading today's gospel, It is hard to understand the women, she is just one more woman asking for a miracle?" However, she was not one more, she was the doorway to many more Gentiles. Many others looking for answers from the worry of starvation of body and soul.

Listening to this reading Jesus seems to be in hiding in hostile territory. He did not want anyone to know he was there. Maybe he was tired, scared in a strange place, lacking faith in that moment... whatever,

he knew his miracles tend to draw crowds, so he lay silent.

As Christians we, like Jesus have a mission. Our mission is more than random acts of kindness, which are rarely as nice as we think, nor as frequent as we would hope. Our mission has clear goals. Like Jesus.

And that begs the question what is the church's mission today?

Unlike Jesus we do not have an unlimited scope for our work. Our mission is a corporate mission: the whole church shares in it. So, what does God expect of us now in today's world? What is our mission today?

Well, if you look up Mission, on the Church of England web site, It's all about planting...and growth...In my humble opinion its much, much, more.

It's to love one another, not just those in our family but also those in our community, irrespective of colour and creed.

To help others whenever we can...to share what we have with those in need.

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To pray, not just to ask or beg for what we want, but also to thank God for what we have...we are so blessed we have a roof over our heads, food in our tummies, a bed to sleep on.. Okay... we may not have the latest designer equipment, but we "brought nothing into the world and take nothing out" (Tim:6 v7). Life is about love, being humble and thankful for what we have. Praying for other who need our prayers.

And yes our mission is about encourage other to love our God...but we cannot force someone to hear a message they are not ready to receive, but never underestimate the power of planting the seed. At baptisms we sow the seeds, but do we encourage the growth and knowledge, do we complete our mission by adding to the numbers of Gods followers? Do we?

The story today ends well for the woman and child. The 'unclean' spirit is gone. The conversation reflects the living situation of that time. She did not come to Jesus as a friend, she was an outsider looking for help. Perhaps her tenacity won the day, or maybe it was just his compassion. What we know is he helped her without asking what her nationality was, was she black/white, was she working, wealthy, deserving...he just helped her...he just helped.

I think today, the church mission is often overlooked. We have become selfish, often greedy, In the gospel today Jesus shows us that our faith and our journey is about mission, and that mission is not just about those we already know...it's about loving others, helping other in need, no questions, no obstacles, just like the emergency service our mission and our journey of faith is clear and precise. We too have goals, objectives, and timelines.

Our mission and journey of faith is set by the example Jesus taught us... "To love one another as I have loved you". To be focused on helping, trying our very best to live our faith and complete our mission. Amen.
