New Testament Reading: 2 Peter 3. 8 - 15a *Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. *The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. 10But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed. Homily - Christine Radford

Lord, may your Spirit so enlighten our minds that we may have a better understanding of your truth and a clearer vision of your love. Amen

John the Baptist was unconventional, and uncompromising. He told it like it is, and that made for uncomfortable hearing, but when he spoke, people took notice. They were moved by his words because they recognized that he spoke the truth. He shone a spotlight on their lives, challenging them to turn from their sinful ways and baptizing them as a symbol of their changed way of life. They responded by the hundreds.

But even as people crowded to him, John never forgot that his main role was to announce the coming of the Saviour. He was never under any illusion about himself; he knew he was not the promised Messiah, but only his herald.

John understood that God had a special purpose for his life, and he could see clearly what it was. There was no-one else capable of doing what John did, and he did it with all his heart.

God has a purpose in life for each of **us** too, though we might not always see immediately what it is. If we are willing, God can use each of us in a way he can use no one else.

Each of us is unique and God made each of us for a special purpose. He has a job for each of us to do that nobody else can do as well as we can.

Out of the billions of possible applicants, only one is qualified – you or I. Only one has the right combination of what it takes – you or I.

Just think, even if you are an identical twin, in all the world, there is no-one exactly like you. Since the beginning of time there has never been another person **exactly** like you. No-one in the universe sees things **exactly** as you do.

You are unique and so is your purpose.

John discovered **his** purpose and he used his gifts to the full. By doing so, he gave a gift to the people around him, preparing them for the coming of Jesus, opening their eyes to the things that were wrong in their lives and showing them how to change, while there was still time. But always he pointed to Jesus.

Jesus Christ is the true light. He helps us see our way to God and shows us how to walk along that way. Jesus has chosen to reflect his light through us, his followers. We are no more the light than John was, we are just mirrors that reflect His light.

Have you ever sat outside on a bright sunny day and used a mirror to reflect the sun's light? It's a simple way of amusing yourself for a few minutes when you have nothing else to do. You can reflect the light against a wall, and watch the patterns change as you change the angle of the mirror.

But you can use a mirror to direct light **with a purpose** into a new direction. You can, for example, stand on a hill and flash the sun's light to attract the attention of someone miles away, and if you both know Morse code, you can relay accurate text messages too.

If a bright light shines on me, and I hold up a mirror I can reflect the light to shine on you. I am not the light; I am just letting my mirror reflect the light to shine on you.

If I am going to reflect the light on you, there are a couple of things that are very important to remember:

- I must keep my mirror facing toward the light. If I turn away from the light, I cannot reflect the light.
- I must make sure that nothing comes between the light and me. If that happens, I cannot reflect the light. We all need to be reflectors of light, not absorbers of light, and we must never deceive ourselves into thinking that we are ever the source of light!

Background: Advent

Advent (from the Latin word adventus, meaning "coming") is considered to be the beginning of the Church Year for most churches in the Western tradition. It begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day, which is the Sunday nearest November 30, and ends on Christmas Eve (Dec 24). If Christmas Eve is a Sunday, it is counted as the fourth Sunday of Advent, with Christmas Eve proper beginning at sundown. Traditionally, the primary colour of Lent is purple, which reflects the Lentenstyle fasting that formed part of the build-up to Christmas in earlier centuries. The colour forms a link between the birth and death of Jesus.

For most Christians it is not just a celebration of a moment in time when a baby was born, but also looks beyond to a time when the Bible tells us that Jesus will come again, not as a weak and vulnerable baby but in power and with authority. The traditional Scripture readings for this time emphasise both the First and Second Coming of Jesus Christ, and our accountability for faithfulness at His coming, judgment on sin and the hope of eternal life.

Advent is also a spiritual journey that Christians take, through the truths of Scripture that point to the birth of Messiah, to a reaffirmation that he has come, is present in the world today and will come again in glory. It mirrors the journey of faith that Christians make after that moment of realisation and acceptance of who Jesus is, in that we take that first step of faith in commitment, continue hopefully to walk the road of faith and increasing understanding, and look forward to our destination, which is to be in his presence forever!

The celebration of Christmas is not known before the end of the fourth century when, according to Duchesne it was celebrated throughout the whole Church - by some on 25 December, by others on 6 January. There are hints of a period of preparation prior to the celebration of Jesus' birth – in a ruling in 380 that no one should be allowed to absent themselves from church from the 17th December until the feast of Epiphany – but it is not until the end of the sixth century that a prescribed period of time was set aside as preparation for Christmas. This was from 11th November, being the feast day of St. Martin of Tours, (the fast became known as "St. Martin's Fast," "St. Martin's Lent" or "the forty days of St. Martin") until Christmas Day.

Today the church also remembers St. Nicholas

Bishop of Myra c326

St Nicholas was an early Christian Bishop of Greek descent in the maritime city of Myra [modern day Turkey]. Very little is known about the historical Saint Nicholas. The earliest accounts of his life were written centuries after his death and contain many legendary elaborations. His generosity of handing out gifts led to his confusion with Santa Claus [particularly from Dutch settlers in New Amsterdam now New York] in America.

Today the church remembers St. Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, Teacher of the Faith


As everyone will remember, we covered him when we looked at the four great doctors of the church back on 6th September. Saint Ambrose, also known as Aurelius Ambrosius, is one of the four original doctors of the Church. He was the Bishop of Milan and became one of the most important theological figures of the 4th century.

He was centuries ahead of his time and the highlights that we have to remember are:

- 1. **St. Ambrose was generous to the poor.** He considered them not a group of outsiders, but rather those of the united people. To him, giving to the poor was just a repayment of God's resources, which were intended for everyone equally.
- 2. **He introduced reforms in the order and manner of public worship.** He was known for his "liturgical flexibility" that kept in mind that the service was a tool to serve people in worshipping God, and ought not to be rigidly fixed in every place.
- 3. **Keeping the church grounded with local traditions:** Ambrose is credited with advising Augustine of Hippo to follow local liturgical customs. "When I am at Rome, I fast on a Saturday; when I am at Milan, I do not. Follow the custom of the church where you are," he stated. This advice remains today, and is translated in English as the saying, "When in Rome, do as the Romans do."

Today's hymn for advent is one of his.

God of hosts,
who called Ambrose from the governor's throne
to be a bishop in your Church
and an intrepid champion of your faithful people:
mercifully grant that, as he did not fear to rebuke rulers,
so we, with like courage,
may contend for the faith we have received;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.



Isaiah 35

God Will Comfort His People

35 The dry desert will rejoice. The desert will be glad and blossom. ² It will be covered with flowers and dance with joy. It will be as beautiful as the forest of Lebanon, the hill of Carmel, and the Sharon Valley. This will happen because all people will see the Glory of the LORD. They will see the beauty of our God.

³ Make the weak arms strong again. Strengthen the weak knees. ⁴ People are afraid and confused. Say to them, "Be strong! Don't be afraid!" Look, your God will come and punish your enemies. He will come and give you your reward. He will save you. ⁵ Then the eyes of the blind will be opened so that they can see, and the ears of the deaf

will be opened so that they can hear. ⁶ Crippled people will dance like deer, and those who cannot speak now will use their voices to sing happy songs. This will happen when springs of water begin to flow in the dry desert. ⁷ Now people see mirages that look like water, but then there will be real pools of water. There will be wells in the dry land where water flows from the ground. Tall water plants will grow where wild animals once ruled.

⁸ There will be a road there. This highway will be called "The Holy Road." Evil people will not be allowed to walk on that road. No fools will walk on it. Only good people will walk there. ⁹ There will be no dangers on that road. There will be no lions there to hurt people or any dangerous animals on it. That road will be for the people God saves.

¹⁰ The Lord will make his people free, and they will come back to him. They will come into Zion rejoicing. They will be happy forever. Their happiness will be like a crown on their heads. Gladness and joy will fill them completely. Sorrow and sadness will be far, far away.

As a quick recap, chapters 28 - 33 of Isaiah say that it is foolish to trust other nations for safety from enemies; only God himself could really provide peace and security. Chapter 34 speaks of the fate of nations that God punished, so as an example, Edom had become a desert. Chapter 35 describes the result of God's action when he changes the desert into a beautiful garden.

Unlike the fate of the country called Edom, Zion's land will become beautiful at a time that God chooses. The fear that makes people weak will be replaced by the strength of knowing and trusting in God. The words represent an order to God's people to be strong and brave themselves. Then God's strong people will be able to encourage other people.

God's action to save shows the double purpose of his arrival - to rescue his people from all that is evil and to bring about good changes for both people and their land. Good news about new health for blind and deaf people has appeared in Isaiah 29:18 and 32:3. The subject will appear again in Isaiah 42:16-19 and 43:8 and 44:18.

There will be a special way there, but only for God's special people. It will be called the 'Holy Road' because it is only for God's special people leading to their permanent home.

I Come, thou Redeemer of the earth, and manifest thy virgin-birth: let every age adoring fall; such birth befits the God of all.

2 Begotten of no human will, but of the Spirit, thou art still the Word of God, in flesh arrayed, the Saviour, now to us displayed.

3 From God the Father he proceeds, to God the Father back he speeds, runs out his course to death and hell, returns on God's high throne to dwell.

4 O equal to thy Father, thou! Gird on thy fleshly mantle now, the weakness of our mortal state with deathless might invigorate.

5 Thy cradle here shall glitter bright, and darkness glow with new-born light, no more shall night extinguish day, where love's bright beams their power display.

6 O Jesu, virgin-born, to thee eternal praise and glory be, whom with the Father we adore and Holy Spirit, evermore. Amen.

Isaiah 40. 1 - 11

Israel's Punishment Will End

40 Your God says,

"Comfort, comfort my people.

² Speak kindly to Jerusalem and tell her, 'Your time of service is finished. You have paid the price for your sins.'

I, the LORD, have punished you twice for every sin you committed."

³ Listen, there is someone shouting:

"Prepare a way in the desert for the LORD.

Make a straight road there for our God.

⁴ Every valley must be filled.

Every mountain and hill should be made flat. The crooked roads should be made straight,



and the rough ground made smooth.

⁵ Then the Glory of the LORD will be shown to everyone.

Salvation: God's Good News

⁹ Zion, you have good news to tell.

¹⁰ The Lord God is coming with power.

He will use his power to rule all the people.

He gathers them like lambs in his arms.

He holds them close, while their mothers walk beside him.

A different translation is given previously for Sunday's readings if you want to compare them.

Chapter 40 begins the second part of the Book of Isaiah and is likely to have been written by a different author.

☐ In **Chapters I to 39**, God warns his people about judgement for sins. In these chapters, Assyria is the enemy. Isaiah himself is living during the events of this period.

□ In **Chapters 40 to 66**, God promises comfort to his people (the word 'comfort' appears 13 times.) In these chapters, Babylon is the enemy where God's people are prisoners. The chapters refer to the situation two centuries after Isaiah's time but unlike in chapters I to 39, Isaiah does not mention any actual events from the history of that period.

The Lord's words are to 'my people' who belong to him by a personal covenant (Exodus chapter 24). Enemies had ruined Jerusalem 70 years earlier but now the people will be able to build it again (see Isaiah 44:28).

The final words of verse 2 may seem to mean 'double punishment' but this would be neither 'comfort' (v. I) nor justice (see Genesis 18:25). The word 'double' has two meanings – either 'twice as much', but can also mean to 'fold in two' (Exodus 26:9). It's the second meaning that Isaiah is using here. The verse refers to an ancient custom. If poor people were unable to pay a debt, they could become slaves (2 Kings 4:1). But the debtor could fix the final demand for the money in a public place and hope that some generous rich person would fold the demand in two i.e. double it. Then he signed his name on the back of the demand (as with a cheque) which meant that he would kindly pay the poor person's debt and this was done in public in front of witnesses so there was no going back. In the same way, God forgives his people because of his great kindness. They could not earn their freedom; God himself acts to rescue them.

The New Testament declares John the Baptist to be the person who is shouting (Matthew 3:3 and John 1:23). Of course, John's message was not about freedom from Babylon, he lived several centuries after the Jews returned from Babylon. But John's message was similar, about the arrival of the Messiah who bring about freedom from sin.

The Lord's road is to be straight and level, free from any obstacle. The Lord will arrive, travelling without difficulty or problems, to come to his people's aid. (Judges 5:4-5; Psalm 68:7-8). It was an ancient custom to construct special ways for the arrival of an important visitor, much like putting out the red carpet today.

The Lord promises that all nations will see him in his great glory. This is the subject of Psalms 95 to 100 in particular.

The Lord is coming to Jerusalem (verses 3-5). He comes as far more powerful than any nation's king. He is bringing with him the people that he has rescued from a foreign country. Although the Lord is so powerful, he is very tender towards his special people.

The phrase 'do not be afraid' appears nine more times in the later chapters (see Isaiah 41:10; 41:13; 41:14; 43:1; 43:5; 44:2; 44:8; 51:7; 54:4). Each time the words are to encourage God's servant to do some task. The servant is not to worry whether he will be capable. God's power will help him. The Lord looks after his people like someone who looks after sheep. The Bible often uses this description, for example: Psalm 23; Zechariah 11:7; John 10:11.

Isaiah is saying that nothing can ever compare with God's power (v 12); his wisdom (v 13-14); his greatness (v15-17); his control (v 22-23); his authority (v24); or his holiness (v 25).

To give honour to the stars in the heavens was of great importance in Babylonian life. But as God created the stars & remembers them all by name, so the God of Israel will certainly remember his own special people.

Sometimes God's people suppose that he has left them and think that he does not still care about them. But it is not true. In fact, God continues to care about his people when they suffer and will bring comfort and aid. Both God's patience and his perfect knowledge are greater than humans can ever imagine.

God's own strength is without limit. He is always ready to give new energy to weak and tired people who trust him.





Elijah had appointed Elisha as his successor. It appears that Elisha knew this departure was coming particularly from verses 2–5 which the lectionary omits; there may have been a prophesy or a vision but the bible doesn't say.

When Elisha is asked what he wants, he asks for a double share of the spirit that Elijah had. It's a really subtle distinction [so well done for spotting it] but he's not asking for twice as much as Elijah had so that he's twice as good as Elijah was. He's asking for the rightful inheritance of the first-born son who, when goods were shared out between the inheritors, received twice as much as the other sons [Deuteronomy 21.17].

And then it happened! Most people, and artists, remember that Elijah is taken up to heaven in a chariot of fire [yes, it's from where the film title comes]. But we know better so extra marks again. He ascends to heaven in a whirlwind [v. | |]; the chariots and horsemen represent God's might and protection not only to Elijah but to all those faithful to him. Finally, Elisha picks up Elijah's cloak [mantle] and repeats the parting of the water, showing that the spirit of the Lord seen in Elijah has come to rest on him.


