Gospel Reading: Luke 1. 26 - 38

²⁶In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, ²⁷to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸And he came to her and said, 'Greetings, favoured one! 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Homily – Elaine to add

Lord... Give us grace not only to hear your words with our ears, but receive it into our hearts, and show it in our lives. Amen.....

My brief today was to do a child friendly homily...well I hope all you adults out there are still young enough to enjoy a childrens homily...so let me start with a question

Have you ever been chosen? A special person to do a special job?

How many times have you been the chosen one? Maybe you were chosen to sing a solo in the school concert...or been the one chosen to read in front of many people, or the one chosen to represent your school at sport or whatever else....

I clearly remember being chosen to play King Herod in the school nativity when I was six years old...I felt really important...but very scared...I was excited and very honoured.

Well today's bible reading is just about this very subject...Being a chosen one...

' the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favour with God. You will be with child and give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus.' (Luke 1:30-31)

Mary was the chosen one...Wow, what a privilege, what an honour, what a shock... Imagine how Mary felt... being the chosen one to have GODS BABY... she was not married but only engaged to Joseph...how would he react...what a massive shock, what a surprise...how can this be...surely there must be a better person for this job...I think Mary must have questioned the Angel... 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Background: Nine Lessons and Carols

When one thinks of the Traditional Nine Lessons and Carol Services services in big churches or cathedrals, particularly that broadcast from King's College Cambridge, it's often easy to forget that this tradition in only a little over 100 years old and, in a proper Nativity story way, began in a shed albeit in Cornwall.


Up to the late 19th century, the singing of Christmas carols was normally performed by singers visiting people's houses, and carols — generally considered to be non-Christian — had been excluded from church services. In the Victorian era, the rising popularity of hymnody encouraged church musicians to introduce carols into worship. An 1875 book of carols, *Carols for Use in Church During Christmas and Epiphany* by Richard Chope and Sabine Baring-Gould, was an influential publication. At around this time, the composer and organist John Stainer was compiling a collection, *Christmas Carols New and Old*, and during Christmas 1878 he introduced carols into the service of Choral Evensong at St Paul's Cathedral in London and other cathedrals also began to adopt carols at Christmastide that year.

Two years later, the Right Rev. Edward White Benson [pictured], at that time Bishop of Truro, conducted the first formal service of "Nine Lessons and Carols" on Christmas Eve 1880. Benson, concerned at the excessive consumption of alcohol in Cornish pubs during the festive season, sought a means of attracting revellers out of the pubs and into church by offering a religious celebration of Christmas. The idea for a service consisting of Christmas music interspersed with Bible readings was proposed by the succentor of the cathedral, the Rev. George Walpole (who later became Bishop of



Edinburgh). The cathedral — a Victorian gothic building — was still under construction, and services were being held in a temporary, large wooden shed which served as a pro-cathedral. The first Nine Lessons and Carols service took place there at 10:00 p.m. on Christmas Eve and was attended by over 400 people.

Bishop Benson was appointed Archbishop of Canterbury in 1883, and the Nine Lessons service began to gain in popularity across the Church of England.



Notably in 1918, the Rev. Eric Milner-White the new Dean of King's College, Cambridge, introduced the service to the college chapel, taking advantage of the established choral tradition of the Choir of King's College, Cambridge. During World War I Eric Milner-White, had served as army chaplain in the 7th Infantry Division and he was concerned that the distress of the "Great War" had hardened attitudes against religion. Taking advantage of the established choral tradition there, he introduced Benson's carol service to King's as a means of attracting people back to Christian worship. It proved very successful, and began an annual tradition.



In 1919, Milner-White made some changes to Benson's original format, notably introducing the tradition of opening the service with a solo treble singing "Once in Royal David's City". This was then

followed by a bidding prayer penned by Milner-White himself, and reordering the lessons.

The BBC began to broadcast the service on radio from

1928 [except 1930] and a different version on television from 1954.

You'll need to cast your minds back to the end of last week when we started to look at Zephaniah which, you may remember, is three chapters of utter misery with a happy ending — so here's the happy part. The LORD has defeated the enemies of Israel. God's people will not be ashamed any longer. They will be famous and people will say good things about them. The LORD will give them back all the good things that they lost in the exile. This will please God and it will be like a big party.

So why do we get this reading now? It's because people ask, 'When did, or when will, all this happen?' Maybe there are two answers:

- it happened when the Jews came back from exile in Babylon, in 536 BC.
- it will happen again when Jesus returns to earth, one of the themes of Advent.



Hannah Takes Samuel to Eli at Shiloh

²⁴ When the boy was old enough to eat solid food, Hannah took him to the LORD's house at Shiloh. She also took a bull that was three years old, 20 pounds of flour, and a bottle of wine.

²⁵ They went before the Lord. Elkanah killed the bull as a sacrifice to the Lord as he usually did. Then Hannah gave the boy to Eli. ²⁶ She said to him, "Pardon me, sir. I am the same woman who stood near you praying to the LORD. I promise that I am telling the truth. ²⁷ I prayed for this child, and the LORD answered my prayer. He gave me this child. ²⁸ And now I give this child to the LORD. He will serve the LORD all his life."

Then Hannah left the boy there and worshipped the LORD.



As we think of God sending his Son to earth born of Mary, here's another story of a mother [Hannah] and her son [Samuel]. Hannah did not expect to have children [see similar stories last week] and dedicated him to God when he was born.

Samuel was still young when Hannah took him to Shiloh to keep her promise to God. She did not try to delay it for a long time. Leviticus 1-7 describes the sacrifices and gifts that people had to give to God. The chief priest of the Temple, Eli, may not have remembered Hannah, so she explained why she was giving her young son to the service of God.



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- I. When God Almighty came to be one of us, Masking the glory of his golden train, Dozens of plain things kindled by accident, And they will never be the same again. Sing all you midwives, dance all the carpenters, Sing all the publicans and shepherds too, God in his mercy uses the commonplace God on his birthday had a need of you.
- 2. Splendour of Rome and Local Authority, Working on policy with furrowed head, Joined to locate Messiah's nativity, Just where the prophets had already said. Sing all you tax-men, dance the Commissioners, Sing civil servants and policemen too, God to his purpose uses the governments, God on his birthday had a need of you.

- 3. Wise men, they called them, earnest astrologers,
- Watching for meaning in the moving stars, Science or fancy, learned or laughable, Theirs was a vision that was brought to pass. Sing all you wise men, dance all the scientists, Whether your theories are false or true, God uses knowledge, God uses ignorance, God on his birthday had a need of you.
- 4. Sing, all creation, made for his purposes, Called by his providence to live and move: None is unwanted, none insignificant, Love needs a universe of folk to love, Old men and women, youngsters and children, On every continent, the whole world through, God on his birthday, and to eternity, Took upon himself the need of you.

This is pure self-indulgence. It's very much a hymn of its era [1960 - 70s] but does it does portray the nativity in a way that no other hymn does. The only hymn book I have with it in is the ecumenical Australian "With One Voice" book. **Words:** Revd Michael Hewlett [1916 - 2000] for many years a vicar in the Diocese of Exeter and author of about 70 hymns.

Tune: There is a tune, but I guess I'm the only person in the world who knows it. You can sing it "The Keel Row" if you know your folk music or "Waltzing Matilda" — whether Australians would allow such a sacred tune to be used with a hymn ...?

What was it in that natal star pre-eminent in the night-time sky that stirred the hearts and imaginations of those magi from the east was it colour brightness conjunction or more a still small voice whispering in the darkness of the world 'This is the sign that will proceed the birth of he who fulfils the prophets' words.' That still small voice which whispers still to our conscience and soul still leads if we will but follow to the stable door





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

Malachi 3. 1 – 4 & 4. 5- end

3 The LORD All-Powerful says, "I am sending my messenger to prepare the way for me. Then suddenly, the Lord you are looking for will come to his temple. Yes, the messenger you are waiting for, the one who will tell about my agreement, is really coming!

² "No one can prepare for that time or stand against him when he comes. He will be like a burning fire. He will be like



the strong soap people use to make things clean. ³ He will make the Levites clean. He will make them pure, like silver is made pure with fire! He will make them pure like gold and silver. Then they will bring gifts to the LORD, and they will do things the right way. ⁴ Then the LORD will accept the gifts from Judah and Jerusalem. It will be as it was in the past—as the time long ago.

45 "Look, I will send Elijah the prophet to you. He will come before that great and terrible time of judgment from the LORD. ⁶ Elijah will help the parents become close to their children, and he will help the children become close to their parents. This must happen, or I will come and completely destroy your country."

So, on the day before Christmas Eve, we have a reading from the final book of the Old Testament. As we turn over the page into the New Testament with the birth of Jesus, we're spanning a gap of about 400 years. It's thought that Malachi prophesied after Haggai and Zechariah in about 420BC.

At the time the Israelites were saying that there is no God! Zechariah 8:3 made promises about 50 years before, but nothing seems to have changed. Malachi 3:1 says that **something will happen!**

'Malachi' is a Hebrew word that means 'my messenger', or 'a person who brings my message'. It probably means anybody who helps to 'prepare the way of the LORD' (Isaiah 40:3). Mark used these verses to describe John the Baptist (Mark 1:2-4).

When the preparations are complete, the Lord will suddenly come to his temple and it will not be pleasant for those using it improperly. In John 2:12-17, Jesus cleared out the temple because the people's behaviour was unholy. So perhaps 'the person that you desire' is irony — what the people are saying they want is the opposite of what they want to happen.

The Hebrew word 'malachi' can also mean 'my angel' and some theologians think that 'malachi of the covenant' is the angel in Exodus 3:2 and Isaiah 63:9. This angel helped to make the covenant. Others think it is Jesus as, when he came, Ezekiel 43:1-5; Haggai 2:7 and Zechariah 2:10 all became true.

In v.2, Malachi tells of how the Lord will clean up the Temple and its worship. The dirt that a refiner burned away included metals like tin and lead but pure silver and gold remained will all impurities removed. The Levites were the tribe (large family) that worked in the temple as priests or helpers. They lived in 48 towns all round Judah (the south part of the country) and Israel (the north part). Once the LORD has purified the priests, then the people will also offer to God gifts that please him as in days of old.

In chapter 4, God says that Elijah will come to warn people that the day of the LORD is near. Joel 2:31 also calls it 'a great and terrible day'. Elijah's job will be to change people's attitudes so people can obey God's commands. They will prepare their lives for God's work among them. But God will punish those who do not obey him.

Luke repeated Malachi 4:6 in Luke 1:17. This links John the Baptist with Elijah. Jesus did the same thing in Matthew 11:10-15 where he repeats Malachi 3:1 in these verses.



Saturday 26th December Feast of St Stephen

St. Stephen, (died 36 AD, Jerusalem; feast day December 26)

- 1. The name Stephen is Greek. Chapter 6 of Acts of the Apostles tells us that he was a Hellenist (a foreign-born Jew who spoke Greek) who lived in Jerusalem and had become a Christian.
- 2. Saint Stephen was one of the first ordained deacons of the Church and also the first Christian martyr. The Greek word from which we derive the English word martyr literally means witness.
- 3. His behaviour, even forgiving those who were taking his life while he was being stoned to death, was a reflection of his faith. It is recorded in Chapter 7 of the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 7:54-60), which immediately follows the Gospels in the New Testament.



- 4. The 6th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles contains an account of the choice of the first seven deacons of the Church. As the Apostles worked to continue the ministry of Jesus Christ as his elders, some of the Greek-speaking widows were being neglected in their practical needs. The Twelve decided to ordain seven deacons to oversee their care. In doing so, the deacons extended the pastoral care of the Apostles, the first Bishops of the early Church, enabling them to attend more to teaching.
- 5. Of the seven ordained, Stephen was the oldest and given the title of "archdeacon," the chief among them. Little is known about him before this account.

- 6. Great preaching and miracles were attributed to Stephen. The Bible records that Stephen "full of grace and power, did great wonders and signs among the people." Stephen's popularity created enemies among some Jews. They debated with him, to generate evidence for their persecution of the early Church.
- 7. They accused him of blasphemy, of speaking against God and Moses. The charges inflamed the local populace which demanded he be tried and punished. When Stephen was put on trial, several false witnesses were brought forward by the Sanhedrin to testify that he was guilty of blasphemy. He was charged with predicting that Jesus would destroy the Temple and for preaching against Mosaic law.
- 8. Stephen was filled with wisdom from heaven. He responded by detailing the history of Israel and outlining the blessings God had bestowed upon his chosen people. He also explained how disobedient Israel had become, despite the goodness and mercy of the Lord. Stephen explained that Jesus had come to fulfil the law of Moses, not destroy it. He quoted extensively from the Hebrew scriptures to prove his case. Finally, he admonished the Sanhedrin (Acts 7:51-53).
- 9. As Stephen concluded his defence, he looked up and saw a vision of Jesus standing at the right hand of God. He said, "Look, I can see heaven thrown open and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God." That vision was taken as the final proof of blasphemy to the Jews who did not believe Jesus was the Messiah or Son of God. For them, Jesus could not possibly be beside the Father in Heaven. The crowd rushed upon Stephen and carried him outside of the city to stone him to death.
- 10. As Stephen was being brutally stoned, he spoke his last words, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit. Lord, do not hold this sin against them." Words which echoed the very words of Jesus on the Cross. Following those words, Stephen died.

Watching the trial and execution was a Rabbi named Saul of Tarsus, a virulent persecutor of the early Church. Shortly thereafter, he would himself encounter the Lord Jesus on the road to Damascus and be dramatically converted. His encounter is recorded in the 9th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. He took the name Paul as a sign of his new life in Jesus Christ and went on to become the great apostle to the Gentiles.

They killed those who foretold the coming of the Righteous One, and now you have become his betrayers and murderers. ⁵³ You are the ones that received the law as ordained by angels, and yet you have not kept it.'

54 When they heard these things, they became enraged and ground their teeth at Stephen. 55 Stephen, filled with the Holy Spirit, gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. 56 'Look,' he said, 'I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!' 57 But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him. 58 Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul. 59 While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.' 60 Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them.' When he had said this, he died.

Matthew 10. 17 - 22

Jesus summoned the twelve and sent them out with the following instruction: ¹⁷ 'Beware of them, for they will hand you over to councils and flog you in their synagogues; ¹⁸ and you will be dragged before governors and kings because of me, as a testimony to them and the Gentiles. ¹⁹ When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say; for what you are to say will be given to you at that time; ²⁰ for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you. ²¹ Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death; ²² and you will be hated by all because of my name. But the one who endures to the end will be saved.


