Today's Readings:

Collect:

Lord of creation, whose glory is around and within us: open our eyes to your wonders, that we may serve you with reverence and know your peace at our lives' end, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Jeremiah 11. 18 - 20 First Reading: 18It was the LORD who made it known to me, and I knew; then you showed me their evil deeds. ¹⁹But I was like a gentle lamb led to the slaughter. And I did not know it was against me that they devised schemes, saying,

'Let us destroy the tree with its fruit, let us cut him off from the land of the living, so that his name will no longer be remembered!' ²⁰But you, O LORD of hosts, who judge righteously, who try the heart and the mind, let me see your retribution upon them, for to you I have committed my cause.

Second Reading: James 3. 13 – 4. 3 & 7 – 8a ¹³Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom. 14But if you have bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not be boastful and false to the truth. 15Such wisdom does not come down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, devilish. 16For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be disorder and wickedness of every kind. 17But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. ¹⁸And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace for those who make peace.

Those conflicts and disputes among you, where do they come from? Do they not come from your cravings that are at war within you? 2You want something and do not have it; so you

commit murder. And you covet something and cannot obtain it; so you engage in disputes and conflicts. You do not have, because you do not ask. 3You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, in order to spend what you get on your pleasures.

⁷Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you.

Gospel Reading: Mark 9. 30 - 37

After leaving the mountain 30 lesus and his disciples went on from there and passed through Galilee. He did not want anyone to know it; 31 for he was teaching his disciples, saying to them, 'The Son of Man is to be betrayed into human hands, and they will kill him, and three days after being killed, he will rise again.' 32But they did not understand what he was saying and were afraid to ask him. 33Then they came to Capernaum; and when he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the way?' 34But they were silent, for on the way they had argued with one another who was the greatest. 35He sat down, called the twelve, and said to them, 'Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all.' 36Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, 37'Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.'

THE FIRST SHALL BE LAST......

Mark 9 v.30-37

"May the words that I write and the thoughts and meditations of those who read them be now and always acceptable in your sight, Oh Lord our Rock and our Redeemer." Amen

I have lost count of the many interesting people I have encountered while standing in queues from Alton Towers to Panjim. If queuing was to become an Olympic sport then Team GB should excel. However, in most other parts of the world it seems not to be the case. How many of us have arrived at a bus stop or train station when on a continental holiday to find ourselves alone until the transport arrives? At this point the restaurants empty, the crowds arrive from hedgerow and byway and someone inevitably says -"the first shall be last and the last shall be first." Another example of an everyday phrase or saying that many do not know is biblical in origin.

But, what did Jesus really mean with this saying that Mark records for us? Mark's gospel is the earliest and is sharp and to the point. He does not deal with interpretation but records events as and when they happened and often seems in awe of what he describes. Prior to this section there had been a situation that could have been a turning point in Jesus's ministry as far as we are concerned.

I believe that although Jesus was divine he allowed himself to become truly human to experience all those feelings and worries; and joys, that we experience. Although he overcame the temptations in the wilderness, these did not end there. He was born a Jew, brought up a Jew, in a society that was male dominated with little regard to "women's' rights" and a prejudice against the Gentile world especially the traditional enemies of the Jewish race. He must have been subject to decisions, confrontations, doubts about his mission.

Fast wind back a few weeks to the story as told by Mark of the Phoenician woman, a Syrian by birth who came to Jesus asking him to cure her daughter who had mental health problems. Initially Jesus was reluctant to intervene as she was of a race hated and ostracised by the Jews. If he intervened he risked alienating himself from the Jews, the chosen, who he had come to "save', to bring back to the ways of their God. Indeed his own disciples would probably have been shocked if Jesus even considered speaking to this woman. However he answers the woman with these well-known words, "Let the children be satisfied first, it is not right to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs." This may well have satisfied the disciples and the other Jewish listeners but it did not satisfy the woman. She replied "even the dogs under the table eat the children's scraps."

At this point not only did Jesus heal the woman's daughter but I feel it was at this point that Jesus fully realised his mission was not only to the chosen people but to the Gentiles - to the whole world. Otherwise we may well not be worshipping together today . The first to receive the message rejected it, the Gentile world embraced it. One view of the first being last and the last first.

However, Mark goes on to record a kind of power struggle culminating with the requests of James and John (which we will read of in due course) They seem to have wanted a prominent position in the cabinet of a type of heavenly parliament to come. Even before that, as we gather from the gospel reading they had been whispering who was the greatest so Jesus confronts them "if anyone wants to be the first he must make himself last of all and servant of all." Not an easy ask.

To answer their question of who is the greatest Jesus takes a young child after saying "if anyone one wants to be first, he must make himself last and the servant of all." A child, the epitome of innocence, as yet untouched, unconditioned, uncorrupted with the current prejudices, greed and self-importance and attitudes that had infiltrated the religious and secular life of the times.

"Brother, sister, let me serve you, let me be as Christ to you; pray that I may have the grace to let you be my servant too."

The words of Mark's gospel, as well as the verse from the hymn are hardly shrouded in mystery. We read and sing them but do we do as we read or sing? Or in contemporary jargon, do we "put our money where our mouth is?"

Another gospel reference sees Jesus saying "Go and do Thou likewise."

"Oh God our Father, help us today and every day to live as true men and women. Help us to live as Christ did, putting duty before pleasure, others before self, and no one before you." Amen.


