Readings for Sunday 19th March 2023

Collect:

God of love, passionate and strong, tender and careful: watch over us and hold us all the days of our life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

First Reading: 1 Samuel 1. 20 - 28

²⁰ So it was that Hannah became pregnant and gave birth to a son. She named him Samuel, and explained, "I asked the LORD for him."

²¹ The time came again for Elkanah and his family to go to Shiloh and offer to the LORD the yearly sacrifice and the special sacrifice he had promised. ²² But this time Hannah did not go. She told her husband, "As soon as the child is weaned, I will take him to the house of the LORD, where he will stay all his life."

²³ Elkanah answered, "All right, do whatever you think best; stay at home until you have weaned him. And may the LORD make your promise come true." So Hannah stayed at home and nursed her child.

²⁴ After she had weaned him, she took him to Shiloh, taking along a three-year-old bull a bushel of flour, and a leather bag full of wine. She took Samuel, young as he was, to the house of the LORD at Shiloh. ²⁵ After they had killed the bull, they took the child to Eli. ²⁶ Hannah said to him, "Excuse me, sir. Do you remember me? I am the woman you saw standing here, praying to the LORD. ²⁷ I asked him for this child, and he gave me what I asked for. ²⁸ So I am dedicating him to the LORD. As long as he lives, he will belong to the LORD."

Then they worshipped the LORD there.

Second Reading: Colossians 3. 12 - 27

¹² You are the people of God; he loved you and chose you for his own. So then, you must clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. ¹³ Be tolerant with one another and forgive one another whenever any of you has a complaint against someone else. You must forgive one another just as the Lord has forgiven you. ¹⁴ And to all these qualities add love, which binds all things together in perfect unity. ¹⁵ The peace that Christ gives is to guide you in the decisions you make; for it is to this peace that God has called you together in the one body. And be thankful. ¹⁶ Christ's message in all its richness must live in your hearts. Teach and instruct one another with all wisdom. Sing psalms, hymns, and sacred songs; sing to God with thanksgiving in your hearts. ¹⁷ Everything you do or say, then, should be done in the name of the Lord Jesus, as you give thanks through him to God the Father.

Gospel: Luke 2. 33 - 35

³³ The child's father and mother were amazed at the things Simeon said about him. ³⁴ Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother, "This child is chosen by God for the destruction and the salvation of many in Israel. He will be a sign from God which many people will speak against ³⁵ and so reveal their secret thoughts. And sorrow, like a sharp sword, will break your own heart."

New Bishop of Bolton announced by Downing Street



He will be consecrated to be the sixth Bishop of Bolton at York Minster in June 2023. Matthew will succeed the Rt Revd Mark Ashcroft, who retired as Bishop of Bolton last month.

Matthew was ordained in the Diocese of Sheffield in 1996 and served his curacy at Christ Church in

The next Bishop of Bolton will be the Revd Dr. Matthew Porter, currently Vicar of St Michael le Belfrey in York, 10 Downing Street has announced.



Dore. Since 2010, he has held the role of Vicar of St Michael le Belfrey in York, a resource church involved in church planting and revitalisation, with a broad range of ages including lots of students and young adults.

Matthew is an author, has recently completed doctoral studies in church planting, and in 2022 was appointed an Honorary Chaplain to the Queen, and then the King.

He is passionate about evangelism, discipleship and developing leaders, and particularly serving people in poverty and young people in the North of England.

Matthew often describes himself as 'a follower of Jesus and a leader in God's church – in that order.' He believes that nothing of lasting significance happens without prayer.

He says: 'I'm humbled and thrilled to be called to be the next Bishop of Bolton, working with Bishop David and Bishop Mark. While sad about leaving The Belfrey in York, I'm coming to the Manchester area in prayerful expectation, excited to be the lead bishop in mission, growth and church planting, and looking forward to serving the people and church of such a fantastic part of the North.'

Matthew was introduced to representatives from across the Diocese of Manchester at Saint Philip's, Chapel Street, Salford, before meeting local dignitaries at Bolton Town Hall. He then

travelled to St. John's House, the new diocesan offices in Bury, to meet clergy, staff, and lay leaders.

Welcoming Matthew to his new role, The Rt Revd Prof. David Walker, Bishop of Manchester said, 'I am delighted that Matthew Porter is to be the next Bishop of Bolton. He will build on the work done in recent years, further strengthening our skills and passion for mission both in the Bolton and Salford archdeaconries and across the wider diocese.

"He brings us immediate experience of parish life and particular gifts in enabling church planting and church growth. He is deeply committed to God's mission here in the North, and will be a great asset not only in Manchester Diocese but across the Northern Province."



Stephen Cottrell, Archbishop of York said: "Having recently spent a few days in the lovely Diocese of Manchester, I have no doubt that Matthew Porter will make a great addition to the team. He will bring his experience, passion and expertise in parish development, church planting and mission. But also his prayerful humility and godliness.

"Under his guiding hand the parish of St Michael le Belfrey in York has gone from strength to strength, particularly building a

powerful and innovative partnership with the diocese to further parish revitalization. As Bishop of Bolton and as part of the leadership team for the Manchester diocese he will be wise leader, pastor and teacher. We will miss him in York."

Matthew is married to Sam who is a carer and values hospitality, and they have five grown-up sons. Like his three eldest sons who work in creative industries, Matthew appreciates artistry, architecture and good design. He also loves a flat white coffee and bacon sandwich (with ketchup, not brown sauce) and since childhood has been a supporter of Manchester United.

Acting Archdeacon of Bolton and Salford

Last week we shared the news that Archdeacon Jean Burgess is to leave the diocese in early June.

Bishop David has asked the Area Dean of Bury and Rossendale, Revd Canon Dr. Rachel Mann to be Acting Archdeacon of Bolton and Salford until a permanent appointment is in post.

This is likely to be at some point in the early autumn. We are pleased to inform you that Rachel has agreed to take on these duties and responsibilities.

Bolton Chamber Orchestra Concert A French Programme

Emmanuel Chabriet [1841-94] was a French composer and this piece is another example of the best Spanish music being written by non-Spanish composers. Riding on this success of España, Chabrier composed the Habanera in 1885 which was met with equal enthusiasm. It's a beautiful example of the Spanish genre that was so popular with French composers. Chabrier composed the Habanera originally for piano but it was soon circulated in various arrangements. In 1889 Chabrier himself transcribed the piece for orchestra. Chabrier was

associated with some of the leading writers and painters of his time. Among his closest friends was the painter Édouard Manet, and Chabrier collected Impressionist paintings long before they became fashionable.

Gabriel Faure [1842-1924] was the choir director at the very fashionable La Madeleine church in Paris and is best known for his songs – even his Requiem Mass can be seen as a set of French chansons. Masques et bergamasques, Op. 112, is an orchestral suite by Gabriel Fauré. It was arranged by the composer from incidental music he provided for a theatrical entertainment commissioned for Albert I, Prince of Monaco in 1919 for the Monte Carlo theatre. The original score contained eight numbers, including two songs for tenor, and a choral passage almost all derived from previous pieces he had composed. These numbers were not included in the published suite, which has four movements - overture, minuet, gavotte & pastorale. Faure's relationship with the Catholic Church could be strained. He was regularly seen stealing

out during the sermon for a cigarette, and in early 1870, when he turned up to play at Mass one Sunday still in his evening clothes, having been out all night at a ball, he was asked to resign.

Claude Debussy [1862-1918] is often seen as the first Impressionistic composer although he rejected the title. His **Petit Suite** started life as a piano duet first performed in 1889 but is best known in the orchestral transcription by Henri Busser. It has four movements:

- I. En bateau (Sailing): Andantino
- 2. Cortège (Retinue): Moderato
- 3. Menuet: Moderato
- 4. Ballet: Allegro giusto

Charles Gounod [1818-93] is remembered today for the most famous of his 12 operas "Faust", the "Funeral March of a Marionette" and the tune he wrote above a Bach prelude in C major to which a third hand set the words of the "Ave Maria." His Symphony number I in D major has four movements and was first performed in 1855 [he wrote both his symphonies in the same year]. This formed the model for his pupil Georges Bizet's [of Carmen fame] First Symphony in C which the orchestra have played for us in previous years.

The first movement flows along with a charming grace and elegance. It is in sonata form, with three musical ideas which are treated with inventive development. The second movement has a more humorous character, with a light bouncing theme in the minor mode, contrasted by a central fugal section. The third movement is a scherzo and trio, with a teasingly playful subject, perhaps a distant reference to Haydn. The final movement has a short slow introduction, before the drive and energy of the first movement returns, amplified by dramatic interludes for the trumpets and drums.
