⁴Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. ⁵I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. ⁶For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; ⁷for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

⁸Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in

suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, ⁹who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, ¹⁰but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Saviour Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. ¹¹For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, ¹²and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. ¹³Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. ¹⁴Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.


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Ralph Vaughan Williams – 150th Anniversary

(b. Down Ampney, Gloucestershire, England, October 12, 1872;
d. Westminster, London, England, August 26, 1958)

A passionate supporter of English folk song and its expansion, Ralph Vaughan Williams was aware that the village band singers in communities were the same ones that sang in churches on Sunday.





Visited by the Rev Percy Dearmer, Vaughan Williams at first thought the clergyman wanted to persuade him to do what he did and invite tramps to sleep in his drawing-room. Dearmer though, wanted Vaughan Williams to edit the music of the English Hymnal. He said the work would take just two months but it turned into two years hard labour for the composer who initially claimed that he knew little or nothing about hymns. Dearmer told him that if he refused he would go to his rival, Henry Walford Davies and recruit him. 'Hang on a minute' Vaughan Williams responded and promptly accepted the post.

The Anglican Church had never promulgated an 'official' hymn book, but by default *Hymns Ancient & Modern*, first published in 1861, became almost that. Various revisions appeared over coming years, but a completely new edition in 1904 changed too many texts and ditched too many well-loved tunes.

This prompted Dearmer and a group of like-minded churchmen to plan a 'local' supplement for Primrose Hill, entitled *English Hymns*. This soon became a large-scale publishing project with Oxford University Press. The book was eventually to contain more than 700 hymns with matching tunes, and the title changed to *The English Hymnal*. 'THE ENGLISH HYMNAL is a collection of the best hymns in the English language', proclaimed Dearmer's Preface, 'and is offered as a humble companion to the Book of Common Prayer for use in the Church.'



Vaughan Williams, aged 32 in 1904, was still at the outset of his composing career. In 1895 he had been appointed to what he called his 'first and last organ post', at St Barnabas Church, South Lambeth. The appointment, he said, had given him an insight into good and bad church music. Dearmer, hearing of Vaughan Williams from the folk song collector Cecil Sharp, had decided that this all-round, practical musician was the man he required as Music Editor for *The English Hymnal*.

On his musical choice, Vaughan Williams was unequivocal. 'It ought no longer to be true anywhere', he proclaimed in his Preface, 'that the most exalted moments of a church-goer's week are associated with music that would not be tolerated in any place of secular entertainment.' His vision was that *The English Hymnal* should become a reference of the world's finest hymn tunes. The music, Vaughan Williams said, was designed to be essentially congregational in character. Unsuitable 'modern' or 'enervating' tunes were rejected, replaced with a rich and varied selection made from sources hitherto unimagined for a hymn book.

Set within Vaughan Williams's selection of tunes were plainsong melodies which were neither chosen nor harmonized by Vaughan Williams. 'On this subject I was really ignorant', he said, 'so I refused to touch it'.

Vaughan Williams wondered whether he had been wasting time on hymn tunes while adding 'nothing to the sum of my musical invention'. But he concluded that his two years of work, sifting

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through some of the best (as well as the worst) tunes in the world, was 'a better musical education than any amount of sonatas and fugues' could ever have been.

Vaughan Williams's use of English folk songs as the basis for hymn tunes seemed disturbing for some: critics bemoaned the 'atmosphere of secularity' which such melodies engendered. Vaughan Williams robustly defended his process and 31 English folk songs appear as hymn tunes in the 1906 edition.

In November 1905, Vaughan Williams, transcribed in Sussex a song called 'The Royal George' from a Mr and Mrs Verrall which, named SUSSEX, became the tune for 'Father, hear the prayer we offer'.

Vaughan Williams's transcription of 'The Ploughboy's Dream' (collected in December 1903 at Forest Green near Leith Hill, Surrey) became in its *English Hymnal* incarnation FOREST GREEN, for 'O little town of Bethlehem'.

Vaughan Williams's 'twentieth-century composers', each approached to provide new tunes especially for hymns of unusual or irregular meter in *The English Hymnal*, included John Ireland, Sir Walter Parratt, and Gustav Holst. Of the tunes contributed by Holst it was CRANHAM, for Christina Rossetti's poem 'In the bleak mid-winter' (a 'carol' in the book's Christmas sequence), which endured. In a few cases, new words were commissioned to fit specific tunes. Athelstan Riley's 'Ye watchers and ye holy ones', for example, was written for Vaughan Williams's harmonization of the 17th-century German melody LASST UNS ERFREUEN.

Aside from his folk song adaptations, Vaughan Williams himself provided only four original tunes two of which have become classics. Hymn tunes he considered sub-standard but couldn't ditch appeared unnumbered at the back of the book, not set to any words in what he called his "Chamber of Horrors" – the tune "St Clement" [condemned by RVW as a feeble waltz] but sung to "The Day thou Gavest" is in that supplement.

To mark his 150th anniversary we'll be using his music at St. Bartholomew's on Sunday morning:

- Come Down, O love divine to his original tune Down Ampney the place of his birth
- Who would true valour see to his arrangement of Monks Gate [see October newsletter]
- Father, hear the prayer we offer to his arrangement of the tune Sussex
- Go to the world to his original tune Sine Nomine

And the choir will sing his arrangement of George Herbert's poem "The Call" - *if you now RVW's compositions such as "The Lark Ascending" or "Fantasia on a Theme by Thomas Tallis" you'll recognise all the harmonies.*

- 1 Come, my Way, my Truth, my Life: such a way as gives us breath; such a truth as ends all strife; such a life as killeth death.
- 2 Come, my Light, my Feast, my Strength: such a light as shows a feast; such a feast as mends in length; such a strength as makes a guest.
 - 3 Come, my Joy, my Love, my Heart: such a joy as none can move: such a love as none can part; such a heart as joys in love.

The cost to the church is minimal [less than 1p per transaction] so it's an easy and effective way to give to our churches.


St George's School Governors

This is an important and rewarding voluntary role, offering the opportunity to make a positive difference, and to be part of the team working to promote the school's success. Foundation Governors need not be professionals or experts in the field of education, but simply need an interest in the school and in the welfare of our children, and the time and willingness to get involved.

The time commitment required is approximately 6-8 hours each term, comprising of two meetings per term, some preparation time for those meetings, and some additional time supporting monitoring activities in school. The meetings are usually held in the evening apart from one meeting during the day in the summer term.




